Honoraria and Travel Awards Committee

Mission:

The Committee's mission is to select graduate and undergraduate students to be honored for their research in mammalogy, and to select travel grant recipients in two categories, early-career and student.

Information Items:

- (1) The Committee welcomed 4 new members this year, M. Martin, K. Stanchak, R. Stephens, and B. Tannis, and lost 2 members.
- (2) From 11 applications, the Honoraria and Travel Awards Committee awarded four graduate honoraria, each for \$2,000: the Anna M. Jackson Award to **Addison Allen** (University of Oklahoma); the Elmer C. Birney Award to **Saeideh Esmaeili** (University of Wyoming); the A. Brazier Howell Award to **Lisa Walsh** (University of Michigan), and the Annie M. Alexander Award to **Mariah Schlis-Elias** (Austin Peay State University).
- (3) From 7 applications, the Committee awarded 2 undergraduate honoraria of \$1,200. The awardees were **Anantha Miller-Murthy** (Yale University) and **Sandy Slovikosky** (University of Arizona).

The table below summarizes the recent history of honoraria applications, revealing the high inter-annual variability in the number of applications:

- (4) We again were very pleased with the number and quality of applications in 2020 and will continue our efforts to advertise and promote the Honoraria program widely using multiple communication platforms, including social media. Sean Maher, the Informatics Committee Chair, has continued to help improve the committee's webpage and with Honoraria application submission, and we will continue to update it to provide clear instructions to applicants and to streamline the online submission process. We also extend special thanks to Cody Thompson, Program Committee Chair, and Kerrell Dunsmore with The Next Great Event, for significant help with advertising these opportunities.
- (5) Based on discussion during the Board of Directors Meeting in 2018, the Chair again evaluated diversity of applicants and recipients of the 2019 Travel Awards (see table in report appendix). Data were provided by the Program Committee and collected during registration for the 2018 and 2019 meeting. All data in the table are reported in percentages.
- (6) Based on feedback from the 2018 Board of Directors Meeting in Manhattan, KS, we completed a second year using a new format for abstract submission and a new review procedure for the Travel Awards. The current abstract submission process allowed students and early career applicants to apply for a travel award without having to pay for registration. The primary reasons behind the changes were to reduce the number of withdrawal reimbursements for the Program Committee and allow students to apply without potentially paying a fee to cancel their registration if they did not receive an award. E. Flaherty created a submission portal using Qualtrics for abstract submission during the first trial year of the new format.

Because of concerns raised in 2018 regarding unconscious/implicit bias with the review process, applicants were asked to remove names and institutions on the abstracts written in Word before committee review.

(7) A total of 75 mammalogists submitted abstracts for evaluation for Travel Awards. This number represented a significant decrease from the previous year but is consistent with years preceding the meeting in Washington, D.C. (2019-144, 2018-60, 2017-72, 2016-53, 2015-121, 2014-94, 2013-140).

The 75 abstracts were divided into 2 categories for evaluation: 14 early-career abstracts (2019-24, 2018-10, 2017-10, 2016-7, 2015-20, 2014-11, 2013-29) and 61 student abstracts (2019-120, 2018-50, 2017-61, 2016-43, 2015-84, 2014-80, and 2013-109). Of these applicants, 9 were from students supported by past Grants-in-Aid, 1 was a past honoraria recipient. Each abstract was reviewed by 10 committee members however results were not shared with applicants because of cancellation of the 2020 meeting. No complete applications were submitted for the Care Giver Award this year.

Last year's budget request to the Board was \$7,000 for 10 early-career travel awards of **\$700** each (with one of those potentially offered as a Care Giver Award) and \$12,000 for 30 student travel awards of **\$400** each. Because of cancellation of the 2020 meeting due to Covid-19, none of these funds were awarded.

(8) The Committee is requesting a modest increase in our requested amount for the 2021 travel awards because of the increased travel costs expected to attend the joint meeting in Anchorage, AK.
