THE FIRST FIFTY YEARS OF THE AMERICAN SOCIETY OF MAMMALOGISTS

The American Society of Mammalogists was "founded" on 3 April 1919 for on that and the following day, it held its first meeting. In the 50 years since its organization, the Society has held meetings annually, except for two years during World War II, has published a journal annually since 1920, and promoted the interests of mammalogy in other ways. Among American biological organizations, this Society now ranks among the top 11 in total memberships; for societies primarily interested in the vertebrates, among the top four.

At the organizational meeting held in Washington, D.C., 3-4 April 1919, about 60 persons were in attendance. Before this meeting, there had been much thought and planning for the formation of such a new society, especially by Hartley H. T. Jackson. In this endeavor, he was assisted by his wife, Anna, and by Walter P. Taylor. In advance of the first meeting, the organization's bylaws and order of business had been drafted. At the meeting these were discussed at length, modified in minor detail, and then approved. Thereafter, officers for the new Society could be elected. C. Hart Merriam was elected president, E. W. Nelson and Wilfred H. Osgood, vice-presidents, H. H. T. Jackson, corresponding secretary, W. P. Taylor, treasurer, H. H. Lane, recording secretary, and Joel A. Allen, honorary member. Ten members were elected to the Council (now Board of Directors), five for a 1-year term-R. M. Anderson, M. W. Lyon, Jr., W. D. Matthew, T. S. Palmer, E. A. Preble-and five for a 2-year term-G. M. Allen, J. Grinnell, J. C. Merriam, G. S. Miller, Ir., and W. Stone. The original, hand-written copies of the various sessions of the organizational meeting are in the historical files of the Society. Of the persons present at this organizational meeting, seven were still living on the fiftieth anniversary of the Society: J. Warren Craven, Hartley H. T. Jackson, Mrs. T. S. Palmer, Miss Viola Schantz, Waldo L. Schmitt, Walter P. Taylor, and Alexander Wetmore.

Serious planning for the American Society of Mammalogists got started 4 months earlier at a 5 December 1918 meeting of the staff of the United States Biological Survey at which time the advisability of launching a new organization for the promotion of the study of mammals was discussed. A committee to canvass the sentiments of mammalogists for such an organization was appointed with Hartley H. T. Jackson, chairman, A. H. Howell, Ned Hollister, E. A. Preble, and Walter P. Taylor, secretary. This committee known as the "Committee on the Organization of the Mammal Society" met six times prior to the first meeting of A.S.M. Five non-Washington members were appointed to the committee: Glover M. Allen, J. A. Allen, Joseph Grinnell, Wilfred H. Osgood, and Witmer Stone. A "Synopsis of Proceedings of the Committee on Organization" was prepared and signed by H. H. T. Jackson and in this the following recommendations appear: "(1) That there be organized a society for mammal study to be known as the American Society of Mammalogists. (2) That the Constitution attached hereto be proposed as a basis for further consideration. (3) That the report of the Committee on Organization appointed by the Chairman of the meeting of the Scientific Staff of the Biological Survey on December 5, 1918, be received and the committee discharged, it being understood that the committee would be immediately reorganized as a permanent Committee on Organization independent of the Survey. (4) That plans be made for holding a formal organizational meeting of the new Society if possible in March, 1919." Furthermore, the report pointed out that "the By-laws were agreed upon as they will be presented to you for action. The Committee is divided upon only one point-that in regard to classes of members-and it leaves that point without recommendation to the judgment of the Society." Other matters of concern to the Committee were voting privileges of the various membership classes, annual dues, a name for the proposed journal, and officers for the new society. Dr. Jackson's deep concern for the establishment of such a society and his hard work made possible the first annual meeting in April of 1919, and the well-planned bylaws helped assure its continued success. The original "call" to join the new Society was published in Science in 1919 (49:189, 1919) and in addition this "call" was sent to about 3000 prospective members.

During the first 50 years of the Society, there have been 48 annual meetings (the Directors only met in Washington in 1944, in Chicago in 1946). The meetings have been held at 27 sites, including two in Canada and one in Mexico. The Society has held meetings nine times in Washington, D.C., seven times in New York City, four times in Philadelphia, and twice in four other places. Only six of the first 24 meetings were held west of Washington, D.C.: all but six of the next 24 meetings were held west of Washington. Beginning in 1948, it was recommended that every third meeting be held "out-of-doors." Although this schedule was not adhered to, six meetings have been so heldtwo at the Michigan Conservation Training School near Higgins Lake (1947, 1956), and one each in Yellowstone National Park (1950), Estes Park, Colorado (1954), the Bread Loaf Campus of Middlebury College, Vermont (1962), and Nags Head, North Carolina (1967). Although the number of papers presented at each annual meeting has fluctuated, the largest number of papers prior to the 48th meeting was at the three meetings in which concurrent sessions were held (see table). Attendance at meetings has fluctuated, usually with a correlation between large attendance and large centers of population.

Twenty-six presidents have served the Society. Most have served two-year terms, but three served but one year and two served three years. All presidents served previously as vice-presidents with the exception of Vernon Bailey and C. Hart Merriam.

During the first 50 years, there have been two publishers of the Journal of



Mammalogy: Williams and Wilkins Company (= Waverly Press) and Allen Press (1957 to present). During this same period there have been more than a dozen editors-11 in the first 48 years and a team of three editors in each of the subsequent 2 years. Ned Hollister was appointed first editor and his Committee on Publications reported in 1920 that only one company (Williams and Wilkins) had submitted a bid for the specifications they had established for the Journal of Mammalogy. This bid for 500 copies was at \$2.90 per page, with additional charges for 8-point type, covers, wrapping, addressing, and mailing. The size of the 49th volume was nearly three and one-half times the size of the first. The first volume was completed in 1920 and no special financial assessment was required toward its publication since charter members had paid dues in 1919 but only one number of the volume was printed that year, with four more appearing in 1920. Such names were considered for the new journal as "Bairdia," "Bison," "Puma," and "American Journal of Mammalogy." Probably several distraught authors and editors have applied other names to the journal! Reprinting of various issues of the Journal of Mammalogy was contracted by the Johnson Reprint Corporation in 1960.

The continuum of operation and success of the Society from one annual meeting to the next has been primarily the responsibility of the corresponding secretary and treasurer (since 1957, combined as the secretary-treasurer) and the editor. There were 11 corresponding secretaries and five treasurers, but one treasurer, Viola S. Schantz, served for 23 years, far more than any other officer of the Society. The present secretary-treasurer, Bryan P. Glass, has served as that officer for 12 years and one year previously as corresponding secretary.

SOME HIGHLIGHTS

Monographs and special publications have been financed, edited, and published by the Society. Williams and Wilkins published Monograph no. 1 by A. B. Howell on "Anatomy of the wood rat" in 1926, Monograph no. 2 by E. R. Warren on "The beaver" in 1927, and Monograph no. 3 by Vernon Bailey on

In the same year the "Recent mammals of the world . . ." was published under the sponsorship of the Society. Indexes for the Journal of Mammalogy were published as follows: first 20 years in 1945, next 10 years in 1952, subsequent 10 years in 1961.

Emeritus Membership was established as a new category in 1951 for those persons that had regular membership in the Society for 25 years, or more, were in good standing, and requested such membership. During World War II, special dispensation was made so that servicemen would not be dropped from membership for being delinquent in dues and at the end of the war, a special committee was established as the "Emergency committee for the relief of European mammalogists."

of monies received from life membership dues. However, numerous special memorials have been incorporated into this fund, such as those for J. A. Allen, E. A. Goldman, Albert Shadle, R. A. Stirton, and Fannye Cook. The largest of these was the J. A. Allen Memorial Fund to which 275 individuals and organizations contributed \$7,770.98. A sum of money was contributed by A. Brazier Howell, the income of which is to be used as an honorarium for a young mammalogist. Several mammalogists have provided funds for the Endowment through legacies in their wills. During the first 50 years, no person has requested a recommendation for election to Patron membership (\$1000). Three trustees, appointed first in 1923 by the Board of Directors, manage the Reserve Fund. The services of these trustees have resulted not only in the safeguarding of funds but a remarkable growth in both principal and interest of the portfolio.

The Society has always had several standing committees. Some committees formerly active but no longer in existence were: Trapping Methods, Problems of Predatory Mammal Control, Economic Mammalogy and Conservation, Wild Life Sanctuaries including Provision for Predatory Mammals, Collections, and Life Histories and Ecology.

During the first 50 years of the Society, 60 individuals have served as officers, 14 as trustees, and 81 as directors. Many others have served as members of standing committees, *ad hoc* committees, and local committees on arrangements. All of these persons have served in these capacities without salary but with a sense of dedication and loyalty to the Society. Perhaps this feeling by so many members of being a "part of the organization" and a contributor to the well-being of the Society has been the most important factor in making the first 50 years so highly successful.
